Utah State Plan for FY 2009-2011

Advisory Council, Budget Allocations, and Activities Conducted

Utah has a consumer-majority advisory council that provides consumer-responsive, consumer-driven advice to the UATP for planning of, implementation of, and evaluation of the activities carried out through the grant, including setting measurable goals, in accordance with section 4(c)(2) of the AT Act of 1998, as amended. This advisory council is geographically representative of Utah and reflects the diversity of the state with respect to race, ethnicity, types of disabilities across the age span, and users of different services that an individual with a disability may receive.

The advisory council includes a representative of the designated state agency, as defined in section 7 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 (29 U.S.C. 705); a representative of the state agency for individuals who are blind within the meaning of section 101 of the Rehabilitation Act, (29 U.S.C. 721); a representative of a state center for independent living described in part C of title VII of the Rehabilitation Act (29 U.S.C. 796f et seq.); a representative of the state workforce investment board established under section 111 of the Workforce Investment Act of 1998 (29 U.S.C. 2821); and a representative of the state educational agency, as defined in section 9101 of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965. Other representatives include the Utah Parent Center--parent member (Utah's OSEP funded Parent Training and Information Center); The Arc of Utah--parent member; Utah Disability Law Center (Utah's federally funded protection and advocacy organization); Utah Center for Assistive Technology (state-funded, interagency assistive technology service center affiliated with the Utah State Office of Rehabilitation). These entities advise the UATP, but are not voting members for purposes of the AT Act of 1998, as amended. The advisory council also includes five individuals with disabilities that use assistive technology or their family members or guardians.

The AT Advisory Board has elected to claim comparability on the State Level Device Loan Activity. Device loan programs are provided statewide by several entities, which are described below. As part of information and assistance efforts, UATP identifies consumers who need device loans and refer them to those entities that provide device loans.

1. Centers for Independent Living (CIL) (each CIL employs an AT coordinator). In the state of Utah, there is a strong statewide CIL network (six centers and five satellite offices) serving all ages and all disabilities with a focus on community integration. They provide device loans of various daily living low tech devices and mobility equipment (manual and electric wheelchairs, ramps, as well as scooters). They provide a variety of durable medical equipment (DME) devices and other ADL/IADL devices, as available.

2. Utah Center for Assistive Technology (UCAT) (5 FTE staff). The statewide interagency UCAT is Utah's AT service hub located in Salt Lake City. UCAT was established by UATP in 1991 and has operated as an independent, state-funded agency since 1998. UATP serves on its advisory board and the UATP Advisory Board receives regular reports of its device loan and device demonstration activities. UCAT serves all ages and all disabilities, with an emphasis on employment and community integration. In collaboration with the Computer Center (see #3), UCAT also loans devices such as augmentative devices and specialized computer hardware and software to people with disabilities of all ages.

3. Computer Center for Citizens with Disabilities (2.5 FTE staff). The Computer Center is the hub of Utah's Augmentive, Assistive and Adaptive Communication Team (UAAACT) network. This state-funded network is the primary equipment lending library for the K-12 public education system in Utah. It provides AT training and AAC/computer device demonstration and loans statewide.

4. Area Agencies on Aging (AAA). (FTE unknown)
The AAA statewide network, through its Alternatives Program (programs and services that offer an aging-in-place alternative to institutional care), provides devices loans of ADL/IADL equipment for Utahns over age 60.

5. Additional Service Organizations (FTE unknown)
State and federal programs including: early intervention, early childhood, and local charitable organizations also participate in device loan programs.

Procedures for tracking expenditures and State Leadership activities

UATP's annual budget process results in budget allocations to specific state level and state leadership activities. Cross activity expenses (e.g., telephone, office supplies, travel, etc.) are budgeted equally among the state level and state leadership activities. Just over 80% of UATP's budget is spent on personnel to accomplish the

activities outlined in the Utah State AT Plan. Annually revised staff role statements, annual staff performance appraisals, monthly staff meetings, monthly individual staff activity reviews (between the UATP director or coordinator and individual staff), and meeting minutes and notes from these meetings serve to document the time and effort of each staff assigned to accomplish state level and state leadership activities.

In addition, monthly account requisition reports provided by the business office of the lead agency are reviewed by the UATP director and UATP coordinator to ensure that expenses charged to the federal Utah State AT Plan account are consistent with staff activities during the previous month. And, all other expenses (e.g., telephone charges, materials and supplies purchases, travel expenses) are reviewed monthly to ensure that they are consistent with the activities outlined in the Utah State AT Plan. The business office of the lead agency is satisfied with UATP's efforts to document its time and effort as per federal guidelines. This same procedure enables the UATP director and coordinator to ensure that all program expenses are appropriate to the stipulations of the AT Act of 1998, as amended (i.e., state leadership expenses account for less than 40% of the total state allocation; at least 5% of expenses related to training and technical assistance are allocated for transition related activities).

The UATP supports one device reassignment program and one device demonstration program.

The baseline year is 2007 for the measurable goals for this state plan.

Financial loan program

State financing activities performed include a financial loan program and access to telework loan fund. The year the program began conducting this activity is 1991. The Statewide AT program conducts this activity.

The Statewide AT Program provides in-kind support to other entities via an agreement. The UATP receives financial and in-kind support from private entities.

UATP coordinates and collaborates with other entities for the purpose of establishing a new program or service. UATP also coordinates and collaborates with other entities for the purpose of reducing duplication of programs or services.

This activity is primarily conducted from one central location. Services are offered in person, and by phone, email, mail, and on the following website: www.uatf.org. The total endowment of the activity is \$1,000,000. The primary source of capital used to begin the activity was Title III of the AT Act of 1998. The primary source of support for ongoing operation of the activity is Section 4 of the AT Act of 1998, as amended.

This activity offers loan guarantees, low interest loans, interest buy-down loans and preferred interest loans. The lowest loan amount, as established by the policies of the activity, is \$500. The highest loan amount provided as established by the policies of the activity is \$50,000.

The most recent data (4th quarter 2008) for this program includes 151 outstanding loans worth \$778,181 with \$34,984 in interest buy downs and 73 new loans worth \$586,757. This program is administered as the Utah Assistive Technology Foundation.

Access to Telework Loan Fund

The statewide AT program began conducting this activity in 2003.

UATP provides support to other entities via an agreement. UATP coordinates and collaborates with other entities for the purpose of establishing a new program or service and expanding an existing program or service. UATP also coordinates and collaborates with other entities for the purpose of reducing duplication of programs or services.

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This activity is conducted from one central location. This activity is provided in person, over the phone, through email, by regular mail and on the website.

The total endowment of the activity is \$700,000. Another federal source was the primary source of capital used to begin the activity. Section 4 of the AT Act of 1998, as amended, provides the primary source of support for ongoing operations. The primary types of assistance are low interest and interest buy-down loans. The lowest loan amount provided as established by the policies is \$500 and the highest amount provided is \$10,000. This activity is administered through the Utah Assistive Technology Foundation.

Device Reutilization and Reassignment

The reutilization activity that reassigns general AT started in 1993. UATP conducts this activity.

UATP receives in-kind support from the state and financial support from private entities. UATP coordinates and collaborates with other entities for the purpose of expanding an existing program or service and reducing duplication of programs or services.

The policy of the program for charging individuals with disabilities and professionals for a device is to base the fee on the length/complexity/value/type. The consumer picks up the device at a designated site.

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Individuals with disabilities are either referred to or are already familiar with the program. As a result, they contact the program to find out what can be done to help them suit their needs. An evaluation is performed by a qualified staff person to ensure the AT user is matched to the correct device.

When a device is initially acquired, the person acquiring it will be trained and have an opportunity to ask questions about the device and its functions. In most cases follow-up is done, including the individual using the device contacting UATP with questions.

Typically when the person is done with the device or purchases a device, the device loan period ends. The length of each loan is considered individually.

The reutilization services we provide benefit members of the community that would not otherwise be able to access the technology they need to live independently. It is a joint venture with in-kind support from a Utah durable medical equipment vendor.

Device Demonstration

The Utah Assistive Technology Program provides device demonstrations for individuals who are blind or visually impaired, deaf or hard of hearing, individuals with motor disabilities, individuals with communication disorders and for family members of individuals with disabilities. The UATP started conducting these services in 1992. For blind individuals, device demonstrations include screen reading software such as JAWS or Window Eyes, and notetaking devices such as the BrailleNote, and magnification devices such as CCTV's, and portable video magnifiers.

For individuals who are deaf or hard of hearing, device demonstrations include FM systems, TTY's, and various daily living aids for the home. For individuals with motor disabilities, device demonstrations include switches, XM Systems for daily living, and wheelchairs and scooters. For individuals with communication disorders, device demonstrations include communication devices such as Dynavox, Tango, and various communication boards. For family members, we address their demonstration requests based on an individual needs.

Both UATP and other entities provide device demonstration programs. Targeted agencies or entities that conduct device demonstration include the following entities or agencies with a description of the purpose of the program:

Division of Services for the Blind and Visually Impaired (DSBVI) - Offers device demonstrations on various technologies for the blind, and training on how to use these devices.

Center for the Deaf and Hard or Hearing - Offers device demonstrations on various hearing devices and some training on how to get these devices set up for users.

Independent Living Centers - Offers information and training on low-tech devices that enable individuals to be more independent in home and community settings.

Division of Services for People with Disabilities - Demonstrations are provided to clients when it is applicable for the clients needs.

Educators (teachers and administrators) - Demonstrates AT that benefits students. This is generally done in collaboration with Utah's ATA organization, the Computer Center for Citizens with Disabilities / Utah Center for Assistive Technology.

The Statewide AT Program provides in-kind support to other entities via an agreement, and receives in-kind support from the state. UATP coordinates and collaborates with other entities for the purpose of expanding an existing program or service and for the purpose of reducing duplication of programs or services.

Primary demonstrations are in-person from a fixed location. Secondary demonstrations are virtual demonstrations via technology.

The policy of the program is to not charge individuals with disabilities and professionals for a demonstration. Devices in the demonstration pool are also made available for evaluations and assessments, training and public awareness.

Consumers and attendees have made positive comments about device demonstrations. Some of the comments are included below:

A participant from the online (virtual) demonstration, Electronic Aids for Daily Living, said, "I knew there had to be ways or things available to assist people with disabilities living on their own, but did not have or know of any resources available until now. This helped improve the life of my son."

UATF also provides online interactive trainings to provide consumers, families, and state agency personnel with AT training. These online interactive trainings enable us to reach those living in rural areas throughout the state. We provide hands on trainings on AT for the blind and visually impaired, we collaborate with agencies to provide trainings on AT for the deaf and hard of hearing, training on AAC devices, wheelchair and scooter maintenance and repair, and EADL trainings for those with motor disabilities. These trainings are always well attended and we receive excellent feedback about the content of the various training sessions.

The Lead Agency prepared and submitted this State Plan on behalf of the State of Utah.

The Lead Agency submitting this plan is the State agency that is eligible to submit this plan.

The State agency has authority under State law to perform the functions of the State under this program.

The State legally may carry out each provision of this plan.

All provisions of this plan are consistent with State law.

A State officer, specified by title in this certification, has authority under State law to receive, hold, and disburse Federal funds made available under the plan.

The State officer who submits this plan, specified by title in this

certification, has authority to submit this plan.

The agency that submits this plan has adopted or otherwise formally approved this plan.

The plan is the basis for State operation and administration of the program.

The Lead Agency will maintain and evaluate the program under this State Plan.

The State will annually collect data related to the required activities implemented by the State under this section in order to prepare the progress reports required under subsection 4(f) of the Act.

The Lead Agency will submit the progress report on behalf of the State.

The State will prepare reports to the Secretary in such form and containing such information as the Secretary may require to carry out the Secretary's functions under this Act and keep such records and allow access to such records as the Secretary may require to ensure the correctness and verification of information provided to the Secretary.

The Lead Agency will control and administer the funds received through the grant.

The Lead Agency will make programmatic and resource allocation decisions necessary to implement the State Plan.

Funds received through the grant will be expended in accordance with Section 4 of the Act, and will be used to supplement, and not supplant, funds available from other sources for technology-related assistance, including the provision of assistive technology devices and assistive technology services.

The Lead Agency will ensure conformance with Federal and State accounting requirements.

The State will adopt such fiscal control and accounting procedures as

may be necessary to ensure proper disbursement of and accounting for the funds received through the grant.

Funds made available through a grant to a State under this Act will not be used for direct payment for an assistive technology device for an individual with a disability.

A public agency or an individual with a disability holds title to any property purchased with funds received under the grant and administers that property.

The physical facility of the Lead Agency and Implementing Entity, if any, meets the requirements of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (42 U.S.C. 12101 et seq.) regarding accessibility for individuals with disabilities. (Section 4(d)(6)(E).

Activities carried out in the State that are authorized under this Act, and supported by Federal funds received under this Act, will comply with the standards established by the Architectural and Transportation Barriers Compliance Board under section 508 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 (20 U.S.C. 794d, Section 4(d)(6)(G).

The Lead Agency will coordinate the activities of the State Plan among public and private entities, including coordinating efforts related to entering into interagency agreements.

The Lead Agency will coordinate efforts related to the active, timely, and meaningful participation by individuals with disabilities and their family members, guardians, advocates, or authorized representatives, and other appropriate individuals, with respect to activities carried out through the grant.

In conformance to section 427 of General Education Provisions Act to ensure equitable access to, and participation in, the program for students, teachers, and other program beneficiaries with special needs, the UATP website is fully accessible, specialized assistive technology hardware and software is provided to employees who require such adaptations, online (virtual) trainings and demonstrations are provided in accessible formats (to the greatest extent possible), hiring of employees and program consultants includes special attention to ensure that qualified applicants with disabilities are encouraged to apply.
